1. STUDENT AND EMPLOYEE ACHIEVEMENTS

Joan Parkin and the Incarcerated Students Program report that two graduation ceremonies were held last month. One was at the Central California Women's Facility (CCWF) with 35 graduates and two graduation ceremonies at Pelican Bay State Prison (PBSP) - for one student in general population and the other for an inmate in the Security Housing Unit (SHU). The CCWF was the third FRC graduation at the institution. The PBSP was the first graduation ceremony in the prison's history (it opened in 1989). Many of the students graduated with honors.

J.D. Johnson and the football coaches were busy with all 13 sophomores signing letters of intent for scholarships at 4 year schools. The team GPA for Spring semester was 2.895 ... the highest ever for the Football team.

Terry Baumgartner and the FRC Baseball team season reached the CCCAA Final Four Championships. The Golden Eagles finished the season with a 29-14 record.

- 1) Two student-athletes were drafted in last week's MLB draft.
 - a. **Justin Bohn** (shortstop) drafted in the 7th round by the Miami Marlins. Has elected to sign with the Marlins and will not be attending Oregon State.
 - b. **Jake Bray** (3B/Pitcher) drafted in the 12th round by the Baltimore Orioles. He will sign as well with the Orioles.
- 2) FRC Baseball is one of five Junior Colleges in the <u>entire country</u> to have two players drafted in the top 12 rounds of the MLB Draft and the only junior college in California.

On June 24th **Darla DeRuiter** will be presenting at the California Higher Education Sustainability Conference in Santa Barbara. She will be part of an invited panel that includes CCCCO Assistant Vice Chancellor Fred Harris, and three other representatives from community colleges around California. The topic of the panel is the Art and Science of Sustainability Policy Planning. Darla will share FRC's experiences developing the Draft Sustainability Management Plan that the BOT is currently reviewing.

The collaboration of the CTE and TRiO grants at Feather River College has been working with local schools to administer Keirsey Career Assessments. Pam Becwar, Tanya Mayer, Audrey Peters, and Rajinder Gill have been using this to help children plan for future careers. Additionally, the worksheets students filled out during the assessment will be used to match them to appropriate career booth representatives for one-on-one interviews at the College/Career Transfer Fair hosted at FRC in September.

4. Classified Leadership Institute Report

Connie Litz was awarded a scholarship to attend the Classified Leadership Institute, which was held in Sacramento on June 13-15. She reports the following:

Workshops focused on ways to improve our leadership skills in order to ensure classified staff participation in campus governance, and were centered on the conference theme of "Capitalizing Shared Governance to Ensure Student Success." Most workshop presenters were our peers sharing with us best practices that are proving to be successful at their colleges.
